	Throughout Y11, the 4 fortnightly lessons are divided between the component requirements:
(2 hours per week)	<ul> <li>2x lesson on Component 3 written exam- Section A – Set text</li> <li>1x lesson on Component 3 written exam-Section B – Live Review</li> <li>1x lesson on Component 2-Scripted Performance</li> </ul>
	Component 2: Pupils return to their scripted extracts that they will perform for their component 2 exam in March. Pupils perform 2x extracts from the same play text provided to students by the teacher. They are then externally assessed on use of vocal & physical skills when bringing the text to life & will include myriad techniques learnt in KS3.
	Component 3-Section A: Year 11s are reminded of the plot, characters, themes and story of "An Inspector Calls" which acts as their Section A - Set Text for Component 3. Students are taught how to analyse the text and response in role as a performer, director and designer.
	Component 3- Section B: Students use their theatre trip in year 10 to answer the section B section of the written exam. The intention here is for students to learn the skills necessary to critique a piece of theatrical work. They answer 2x questions about the performance.

Scripts are also used to help develop understanding of people different from ourselves and historical periods.
